COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course covers issues of national income, inflation and unemployment, short run economic fluctuations and business cycles, monetary and fiscal policy, the financial system and financial crises, the open economy and the trade balance. Economic forecasting using macroeconomic indicators.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to Macroeconomic theory and its applications in the real world. The course will attempt to apply the theory set forth in the course to a variety of contemporary economic problems. This course involves the analysis of issues such as national income, inflation, unemployment, economic fluctuations, economic policy, the monetary system, the financial system, and the open economy.
